Automotive History

On March 31, 1932 the Ford Motor Company added yet another dimension to low-price motoring-V-8 power. Despite the great economic depression, the new Ford V-8 which cost just a few dollars more than its four-and six-cylinder contemporaries, once again established Ford as the world's leading producer of automobiles. In 1929, after the introduction of the Chevrolet Six, Henry Ford told his engineers that the next major advancement in Ford cars would be an eight-cylinder engine. Based on his philosophy, "the fewer the parts, the less risk of trouble," Ford and his team began designing a simplified V-8 engine. By keeping the number of machined parts and castings to a minimum, a low cost for the V-8 was achieved. Although almost 70 years old, Henry Ford worked in the plant alongside his engineers and craftsmen, to straighten out any problems that occurred. By the spring of 1930 the first experimental engines were completed, and a year later, after many refinements, the new engine was nearly ready for mass production.

Rumors of the new Ford engine had been circulating in newspapers and motoring magazines for many months. And when Ford called back 30,000 laid-off workers, the suspense grew. About 75,000 customers, who knew little about the upcoming Ford, were so sure it would be an outstanding car that they placed deposits before the V-8 was introduced. People were so eager to see the new Ford that, on the first day it was exhibited, more than 5 1/2 million persons across the nation visited Ford showrooms.

This new Ford, designated the Model 18, featured an L-head V-8 engine with a 221 cubic-inch displacement which produced 65 horsepower. With Ford's smooth-shifting, three-speed transmission it could quickly accelerate to a top speed of 75 mph. The 106-inch wheelbase chassis was offered with 14 different steel body styles, all with shatterproof glass. Production problems plagued Ford for the first few months, and as a result, only 212,057 units were produced in 1932. This was about 15 percent of the original forecast. Nonetheless, Ford had again created a car that would make the motoring world take notice. It was affordable, fast, reliable and had good road-holding qualities. The infamous outlaws John Dillinger and Clyde Barrow both sent notes to Henry Ford praising the speed of the V-8. In England motorists welcomed the Ford V-8. One British automotive journal summed up the new car, "it is...all that can possibly be wanted." In races held in Southeast Asia, South America, Europe and North America, the V-8 Ford established a respectable string of victories. Fords won so many races that many other companies warned their dealers not to accept challenge matches. As a result, most cars then racing in the United States were Ford V-8s.

Meanwhile, Henry and Edsel Ford and their staff were continually improving the Ford V-8 engine, chassis and bodies. Sales steadily increased, and in 1935 almost a million were sold, reestablishing Ford as the world's bestselling car. As proof of Henry Ford's unerring judgment, the V-8 engine developed in 1930 remained in production until 1954, powering millions of cars and truck.
