




The 2019 Show Layout

Vehicle Definitions

The <u>Antique Classes</u> are open to production vehicles 25 years old or older, which were built in factories and specifically designed and manufactured for transportation use on public roads. Judging will evaluate a vehicle relative to its original state as the dealer could have prepared the vehicle for delivery to the customer.

The <u>Contemporary Classes</u> are open to vehicles that are <u>not</u> included in the Antique category, and may be modified and / or newer than the Antique Class vehicles.


GOING ON 40 YEARS!!!

The search began in 1975. A soon to be first time father had his heart set on owning a Stingray just like every other late 20 something year old. Money was tight so looking for something that fit the budget was key. Everyone said he was nuts because in September of 1979, he purchased a 1966 Sunfire Yellow convertible for \$6,300. He would be the 3rd owner of the car. The car was everything he was looking for and it even came with the hard top, extra manifold, all ignition shielding, hubcaps and other misc. parts. The car did have a left rear seal that was leaking so with the help of a good friend (who also owned a service station) the car was trailered back to Muncie, IN where they got it back up to a solid running car and it would stay until June of 2017.

That guy was my father and I was lucky enough to grow up with that car. My dad and I have so many memories with the 66'. I can remember going for rides as a kid and not being able to see over the glove box as we zipped down county roads (I'm sure going way faster than my mother would like to know). Automotive History

The 1912 Cadillac was the first car to be produced with an electric starter-the device which many considered one of the most important advancements in personal transportation. Almost from the introduction of the internal combustion engine, inventors had searched for a practical method to replace hand crank starting. Starters powered by gears and springs, compressed air, electricity and even explosive gases were tried. But none worked well, and some were as large as the engine they were supposed to start. Although inventors and tinkerers failed time after time, the hundreds of broken arms and occasional deaths caused by the kickback of the hand crank were reason enough to keep looking for a better method

At Cadillac, full effort in developing a practical and safe starter got underway in 1910 following a tragic accident. Bryon J. Carter, a close friend of Cadillac President Henry M. Leland, was killed while trying to start a lady's stalled Cadillac on a bridge in Detroit. She forgot to set the spark retard device on the steering wheel, and when the engine started, the crank flew off and struck Carter. "The Cadillac car will kill no more men if we can help it," said the grief-stricken Leland, as he ordered a top priority project to find a substitute.

Cadillac engineers called in Charles F. Kettering of Dayton, Ohio to help with the project. Kettering was an electrical engineer who had developed a small and efficient electric motor to replace the hand cranks on cash registers. Kettering and Cadillac engineers developed an electric starter/generator combination that was small yet powerful enough to start the car and then capable of recharging its battery.

When this small starter/generator was announced, skepticism poured in from other companies in General Motors and around the world. Experts from the world's leading electrical companies said it couldn't work-no small motor could. But, thanks to Kettering's inventiveness, it did and very well. The Royal Automobile Club of Great Britain was so pleased with the reliability of the starter that the club awarded its highest tribute- the prestigious Dewar Trophy to Cadillac for its accomplishment. This was Cadillac's second Dewar trophy and to win two of these awards was at that time an unprecedented achievement. During the fall of 1911, the first 1912 self-starting Cadillacs rolled out of the Detroit plant and into the anxious hands of waiting customer. For the first time anyone could drive a car without annoying crank starting. Sales increased more than 30 percent over the previous year.

Under the terms of a licensing agreement with other car manufacturers, Cadillac made the electric started available to all companies in the General Motors organization and to other car builders on both sides of the Atlantic. In 1913 the Lanchester Company of Great Britain adopted the system, and 98 percent of the American cars in production featured electric starting by 1916. Cadillac's development of "the car that has no crank" was another example of the company's continual search for excellence.
